Our November meeting: Rebecca Johnson on "the TPNW – What next"

Rebecca has been a campaigner for peace for over thirty years. The word indefatigable could have been coined for her, given her continuing commitment to the anti-nuclear weapons cause. She was a famous 'Greenham woman', moving on to found the Acronym Institute for Disarmament which acquired UN status, on the basis of which she was part of all the debates, at all levels, leading to the passing of the TPNW, the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. Following ratification of the treaty by fifty states, it comes into force on 22 January 2021.

In her talk Rebecca gave an account of her work, that of ICAN (the Nobel prize-winning International Campaign against Nuclear Weapons) and the all-important processes the campaigners had adopted. The presentation she made was in a very informal style, accompanied by informative slides.

When you do, you will hear much of the detail of the treaty and of the challenges we now face. The treaty is a most important stage on the way to nuclear disarmament, but does it does not mark the achievement of that necessary aim. Rebecca discusses what we must do and comes up with some suggestions, but makes clear that we have a lot of hard thinking and campaigning to do. However, she does indicate some historical grounds for optimism that we should take to heart.

One final observation. Rebecca is nothing if not a political realist. She knows the realities, from dealing with the police at Greenham Common to high diplomatic policies. But note the following quotation from her talk:

[We should] "not apologise for actually recognising that love and caring and human security and environmental security and respect have to be at the centre of all our political work, our thought and our action on peace. The peace is not an end thing – it is something we build and keep building. Just like in fact disarmament is always something that we have to achieve but then we have to go on making sure they are not bringing the next deadly, horrible hi-tech, you know, engines of annihilation". Cameroon update

The conflict and violence outlined in our September meeting continue. There was a massacre at a secondary school in Kumba on 24th October which provoked international protest. Lord Alton, who has been very active in urging the British Government to take an active role in finding a peaceful resolution, said after the massacre "The need for a ceasefire and a negotiated constitutional settlement has never been greater. As a former colonial power in the Anglophone regions of Cameroon, the UK must actively push Yaounde (ie the government of Cameroon) to engage in inclusive talks to end this insecurity."

Thankyou to all Peace Group members who have been in touch with either their MP or the Catholic Bishop of Portsmouth whose diocese is twinned with that of Bamenda in Cameroon. Fabian Hamilton MP talks on "Peace-building in the post-Covid World" to MAW

Fabian Hamilton MP is the Shadow Minister for Peace and Disarmament and gave this year's MAW Annual Remembrance Lecture on 7th October 2020. He was appointed to his role with, unsurprisingy, no-one to shadow, in 2016 by Jeremy Corbyn and reports that on his becoming party leader Keir Starmer said he wanted him to continue the work - "Keir called me and made clear how peacebuilding was a huge part of his long-term vision for the Labour Party and how Britain behaves on the international stage. As part of Labour's Shadow Foreign Office team, I work closely with Shadow Foreign Secretary, Lisa Nandy, and I lead on issues relating to arms control and the non-proliferation of nuclear and conventional weapons".

This is in itself noteworthy. Your editor cannot recall any similar appointment in the Labour Party since Harold Wilson appointed trade union leader Frank Cousins a minister with a disarmament brief in his 1964 government. (It didn't end very well). It's clearly not an easy job. While Labour policy is pro-independent nuclear deterrent and most of the parliamentary party clearly supports that position, Fabian is likely to be under pressure, and quite rightly, from the peace movement to bang the drum for anti-militarism. (His talk makes clear that he intends to do that). The media will no doubt largely ignore him with a will until its suits their book to make trouble.

The talk covered a very wide range of issues that would and should concern every member of the peace movement. For example, he discusses non-nuclear issues and conflicts all over the world, not just the obvious, if extremely important ones, such as the UK arms sales to Saudi Arabia that enable the war against Yemen to be pursued.

"Our weapons are our responsibility and it's time for a common sense approach to arms sales – an approach that puts British values at the heart of a truly ethical foreign policy" - a refreshing comment when 'British values' are the sort of thing that people like Michael Gove like to invoke vacuously in support of an altogether different world-view.

So I do urge you to listen to, or read, Fabian Hamilton's speech. You may, like me, find that you learn all sorts of things that you didn't know - or weren't very clear about. (Mike Bloom)

War in Nagorno-Karabakh

The fighting over the disputed enclave in the Southern Caucasus apears to have concluded recently with an 'agreement' more or less imposed by Russia, the major power broker in the region. The Turkish state had also meddled, supporting one of the two contestants for control of the enclave in order, it is said by some, to limit Russia's power and influence. For what it is worth, Azerbaijan seems to have achieved some of its war aims, while Armenia – and in particular the Armenians in the enclave – have fared rather badly, with the promise of Russian troops 'keeping the peace' over the next few years. Peace and justice do not seem to be around the corner, alas. We mourn the thousands who have lost their lives in all this.
