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NFLA Steering Committee & AGM held

On the 5<sup>th</sup> February, the NFLA Steering Committee held its first meeting of 2021, as well as the 2020/21 NFLA Annual General Meeting.

Representatives of the four NFLA National Forums elected Cllr David Blackburn to remain as Steering Committee Chair across the year.

The Steering Committee had detailed discussions new nuclear and on radioactive waste and determined that Cllr Sean Chaytor would be its nomination to he NFLA Vice Chair of the LGA NuLEAF group.

# NFLA Scotland concern over SEPA cyber-attack & regulation

The NFLA Scotland Forum met on the 11<sup>th</sup> February with a wellattended meeting to look at its policy moves through 2021.

There was a good discussion on the NFLA Scotland Policy Advisor's report and members welcome the response of the Scottish Government to its ideas for the decommissioning of the Hunterston reactor.

There was also real concern at the recent alarming cyber-attack on the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency (SEPA) which has seen critical information compromised or lost. It was agreed that the NFLA Secretary write to the Scottish Government and SEPA on both issues to seek assurance that safety critical areas of nuclear regulation are protected.

There were also reports from the NFLA Secretary and CND Scotland. The recent 'Beyond Nuclear' & NET defence diversification webinar were welcomed. Its AGM will be held the 18<sup>th</sup> March.

March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2021 will see the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Fukushima disaster – the single worst nuclear disaster since Chernobyl.

NFLA are aware or involved in 3 major events - a IPPNW conference on the 27<sup>th</sup> February, а Japanese environmental groups conference on the 11th March and a CNFE / NFLA / Alliance of Regions webinar on the 12<sup>th</sup> March. These will all be profiled in the March newsletter.

# NFLA plans English, Irish and Welsh Forum meetings

The programmes for the NFLA English, Irish and Welsh Forum meetings are being put together.

The NFLA English Forum webinar will be held on the 5<sup>th</sup> March. It will focus on 3 issues – a specific look at the new nuclear debate, with particular reference to Sizewell C; the West Cumbria coalmine & deep radwaste repository issue; and NFLA reports on the green recovery. A flyer is on the NFLA website to register.

The NFLA Welsh Forum will be held on the 9<sup>th</sup> April. It will look at EDF's decision to look now at 2 sites for dumping dredged mud from Hinkley Point C, the issues over Wylfa and Trawsfynydd with SMRs and local energy reports.

The NFLA Irish Forum is on the 16<sup>th</sup> April and will look at green energy, Beaufort's Dyke and an under-sea GDF.

# NFLA and KIMO raise concern over Hunterston jetty incident

The NFLA has issued a joint media release raising concern over an alarming incident close to the Hunterston nuclear reactor site involving ships coming off their moorings.

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> February, two vessels stationed at the Hunterston jetty broke their moorings during a period of high winds and severe weather.

serious emergency Α was only narrowly avoided by swift action from the emergency NFLA services. and KIMO both support the view of the Friends of the Firth of Clyde that a full independent inquiry is needed. They also

note the ongoing concern that there is just one emergency towing vessel for the whole of Scotland for such serious incidents.

A new report on the transport by sea of radioactive materials by KIMO is being prepared, which the NFLA is fully supporting.

## NFLA note Beaufort's Dyke concern over transport links

The NFLA Secretariat has publicised its continuing concerns that the sea channel between Northern Ireland and Scotland, known as Beaufort's Dyke, may not be the best location for a road bridge or tunnel.

The UK Government has sought advice on the costs and feasibility of a transport link. NFLA have recently published a report noting that the Beaufort's Dyke area is a busy shipping lane with toxic chemicals, radioactive waste and munitions dumped on the surface. A link further north would be very expensive as well.

The NFLA have supported a joint response with other NGOs to the House of Lords Risk Planning & Assessment Select Committee inquiry.

The inquiry looks at the risks to the country of disruptive national hazards.

The joint NFLA-NGO response looks at the risks to the of country an incident involving a nuclear site like Sizewell or Sellafield. The NFLA focus its concerns on nuclear emergency planning risks. The response is on the NFLA website.

# NFLA publish report assessing UK Energy White Paper

The NFLA has published a detailed report on the UK Government's Energy White Paper.

The White Paper is the first cogent statement of UK energy policy for some time. In its analysis, NFLA Policy Advisor Pete Roche and Dr Ian Fairlie note the Energy White Paper is full of lots of promises but contains little detail. Many of the initiatives that may underpin energy policy are still being drafted.

On the new nuclear side, political support is given to large nuclear, small nuclear reactors and a fusion reactor. However, the resources for such work is still unclear, with the likes of Aviva and Legal & General saying they would not fund a large nuclear power plant.

The White Paper says some interesting things about renewables and decentralized energy, which the NFLA will look further into.

# European / UK & Ireland Mayors for Peace progress

The European Mayors for Peace Chapter has reached another milestone in finalizing its statutes and structure. It is also putting together a new website.

The legal statutes will help it structure its work programme and meetings. With the detail now agreed, it is just getting its formal sign-off from Mayors.

A new website will provide new focus for its work and showcase the work done of individual state Chapters across Europe. The Chapter is also looking at further webinars this year.

The General Conference of Mayors for Peace has had to be cancelled due to issues with travel, but a MFP Executive meeting will determine its strategy for the next few years. It is being held in August.

The UK & Ireland Mayors for Peace Chapter will hold a webinar on the 26<sup>th</sup> March. Monaghan, Galway and Cornwall County Councils have all joined recently.
