Our Carrier Based Strike Force

The BBC's Today programme was broadcast from the bridge of our latest aircraft carrier, The Queen Elizabeth, as she prepares for her first mission, leading a strike force to the Pacific. Inevitably, the use of the carrier as the backdrop to the programme led to much praise for its size and capabilities. I was so incensed by the profligate military expenditure and the aggressive nature of this deployment, that I decided to go to see the ship myself. I share these images with you, just to put some reality behind the protest that we may all contemplate around the time of the deployment (23rd May).

The American destroyer, USS The Sullivans, with a squadron of 10 US Marine Corps F-35B Lightning II aircraft will be part of the fleet, along with HNLMS Evertsen of the Royal Netherlands Navy. They will operate alongside six Royal Navy ships, a British submarine with Tomahawk Cruise missiles, 14 naval helicopters, eight RAF fast jets and a company of Royal Marines.

The project to build HMS Queen Elizabeth and sister ship HMS Prince of Wales cost more than £6bn.
