

Although Energy
Minister Greg Hands MP
stated that 'nuclear
safety is a top priority
for this government'
and that 'if a nuclear
installation was
unsafe..it would not be

allowed to be built or operate', the UK Government has no plans to call an indefinite halt to operations at Hinkley Point C whilst the accident at Taishan-1 is properly investigated.

The Minister was responding

Blackburn, who in December asked for a halt to construction works whilst it was determined whether the EPR reactor design, common to Taishan and Hinkley was 'fatally flawed'.

NFLA responds to NDA consultation – more green power and jobs needed

The Chair of the NFLA Steering Committee has responded to a recent consultation by the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority on its latest Business Plan for 2022-25.

The NDA is responsible for the decommissioning of nuclear plants and the clean up of sites. Decontamination is currently expected to take over a century to complete, at a current cost to UK taxpayers of almost £3 billion per year.

In our response, the NFLA called for:

-Dedesignated nuclear sites to be used for 'truly green' renewable energy generation support for host -More communities plant SO employees local and businesses are first offered decommissioning, work on rather than being made

unemployed

-More attention to site security given the increasing terrorist and cyber threats posed to nuclear infrastructure

 -An end to reprocessing, ocean discharges and the reuse of plutonium.

The NFLA also demanded the UK's plutonium stockpile be placed 'out of use.'

UK nuclear 'entente' with foreign partners not so 'cordiale'

January, the Government enacted new legislation, the National Security and Investment Act, to enable overseas investment in **British** infrastructure projects to be blocked.

likely to suffer a 7.7 billion Euro hit to profits because of the French Government's decision to domestic cap energy charges. To top it off, many French EDF reactors are closed for repairs and upgrades, and new projects are being delivered late and well over cost.

Nuclear tax a 'poisoned chalice' for UK electricity customers

Despite UK many customers facing massive hike in electricity and gas bills in April, when the lockdown price cap is lifted, the British Government persisted in taking the Nuclear Energy (Financing) Bill though its Third Reading in the House of Commons.

The Bill now needs to transit the final legislative hurdle of the Lords, before becoming law.

The Bill will require all UK customers to pay a surcharge on their energy bills to subsidise the costs associated with new nuclear projects. This will include compensating operators for cost overruns

and delays and meeting the abortive costs of abandoned projects.

Whilst this represents good news for beleaguered EDF Energy, it is not for Britain's customers, many of whom face fuel poverty. The NFLA has labelled the unwanted Nuclear Tax a 'poisoned chalice'.

NFLA backs European partners in taxonomy dispute

NFLA has cosponsored a letter with our partners in Cities for a Nuclear Free Europe to the EU sent Commission President calling for a change of heart over recent class proposals to

nuclear and gas as 'green energy'.

The 'taxonomy' proposals would, if adopted, allow nuclear operators to access EU structural funds and enjoy more favourable

tax treatment.

Instead the NFLA and CNFE want the EU Commission President to reverse the plan in favour of greater investment in renewables, echoing calls from EU nations such as Germany and Austria.

Feb On 23, Wales 40th marks the anniversary of the All Wales Nuclear Free Declaration of 1982, after made Clwyd followed the other 7 county councils of Gwynedd, Powys, Dyfed, West, Mid- and South Glamorgan and Gwent in passing `nuclear free'

resolutions.

1st 'Banniversary' represents start of year of action on nukes

Members of the UK and Ireland Mayors for Peace Chapter and NFLA had cause to celebrate the first 'banniversary' of the UN **Treaty** the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons on 22 Jan.

As members of ICAN, the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, they helped work to ensure the Treaty Ban entered into force in 2021.

Both bodies are now looking to build on their membership in 2022 and vowed to continue the fight to put pressure on the UK Government to sign the Treaty.

Councillor Manchester Eddy Newman, speaking for the Chapter, said:

"Despite public opinion favouring nuclear disarmament, the UK continues to refuse to their honour solemn promise made over 50 years ago as a signatory to the Non-Proliferation Treaty to disarm."

Leeds Councillor David Blackburn, who is the Chair of NFLA, said:

"We are asking our member Councils to pass resolutions calling on the government to sign the

Treaty. This will be a priority for us over the coming year. We would like to see many more Councils do so in 2022."

In other news, the First Meeting of the States Parties to the Ban Treaty in Vienna has now been postponed to the summer. It is hoped that here the European Chapter of Mayors for Peace will meet and that an Executive Conference can be held.

There are also plans to hold a virtual and inperson Mayors for Peace General Conference Hiroshima in August to mark the 40th anniversary of its founding.
