Can we afford the cost of defence?

Our speaker this month is Colin Archer, former secretary general of IPB, now on the steering group of GCOMS UK, the British branch of the Global Campaign on Military Spending, You may remember that Colin spoke to us in May 2022 about the huge number of questions raised by the Ukraine crisis, and the extraordinary rise in military spending that both preceded and followed it.



In a powerful article in the newsletter of the Columbans Network recently, Colin made a telling analogy: "Our military budget is like a huge tree that dominates your garden, blocks out the light, undermines the foundations of your house, and crowds out all the other plants. It's been there for generations but really your home would be more secure without it."

Colin will tell us exactly how big this "tree" has grown, and suggest ways we can campaign to cut it down to size.

Anne Street was our speaker in March. Late last year she visited Palestine for three months as one of 26 people from 13 different countries who went to serve as ecumenical accompaniers on the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel, a programme of the World Council of Churches. Their task was to act as human rights observers in various locations. Anne was based in the south of Palestine in the Hebron hills. The EAPPI observers compiled reports every evening which were entered into a database and sent to the UN. But their object was to deter breaches of human rights by their mere presence. Although Israeli soldiers and settlers (some of the latter liable to become very aggressive) were well used to the EAPPI observers and did not resort to violence against them, the fact remains that they were armed, so it was a courageous undertaking to be there.

It was eye-opening and moving to hear her experiences and insights. For most of the time she stayed in the South Hebron region and would travel out to a Palestinian settlement nearby to be a presence and observer and to give help and support to those local people. She told their individual stories and they became very real to us; they were all shown to be very determined to hold fast to their rights and their land despite their situation being painful and shocking. Anne's understated description made the powerlessness and sense of humiliation seem more vivid and powerful.

Her excellent talk was illustrated with photographs of the unforgiving barren landscape and text which gave us detailed information but also furnished us with details of everyday life. We heard of a poor working woman whose land is now near to a new Israeli settlement high on a hill. She lives in a constant atmosphere of threat. Some of her land has been designated of historical interest by the Administration – so she is actually forbidden to use it. There are numerous apparently innocent rules which curtail any development. For instance, olive trees, a source of income, can be demolished so shepherding can take place. Land can be acquired so that rifle ranges can be used for defence purposes . Another humiliation is when Palestinians own land, it can be taken over because it can be declared unused land. The rightful owners have to find work a long way off and cannot get to their property very often.

Anne's presence and that of others working on the Accompaniment Programme serves to limit the harassment from the new Israeli settlers and makes life more tolerable. To be fair there are brave objections from

some Israelis against the unfair treatment of Palestinians. We are grateful for the role of Anne, showing great bravery bringing this situation into prominence. It is a situation so often down-played, if not virtually ignored, by the media. Indeed, EAPPI sees its principal task as telling the story when they get back and 'advocating for an end to the military occupation'.

CND's origins - part 1

In 1957 I attended a meeting in Caxton Hall in central London about nuclear war. The main speaker introducing it was JB Priestley, with others: Ritchie Calder, a science journalist and author and family friend, and a young philosophy lecturer at Oxford, Iris Murdoch. She started by stating 'War is Evil' which was a shock to me; I just accepted it as a fact of life, like rainstorms, or being bombed at night, having lived in London through the Blitz. I can feel the shadow of the frisson even now. It had never occurred to me, just a fact of life. There was huge concern among the more thoughtful people: generals always fight the last war and seemed unable to understand the wholesale destruction of nuclear war. We lived through the Blitz? Yes, yes a bit worse than that but we survived. No acceptance that a handful of bombs would turn London into a radioactive wasteland. We young were sure that, should we survive, we would be made infertile. The following year a large public meeting inaugurated CND, with Bertrand Russell in charge. The symbol is the roman one for death; it is also a combination of semaphore for C and N and D. Lesley Lovell

Unite to Survive! Join CND, Friends of the Earth, Greenpeace and XR on 21 April

The Doomsday Clock stands at 90 seconds to midnight, the closest to nuclear and climate disaster we have ever been. The war in Ukraine - past its first anniversary with no signs of ending - means the threat of nuclear war remains incredibly high.
