Questionnaire on making lanterns

(1) What were your thoughts when painting the lanterns?

"My grandmother was an A-bomb survivor. There is a person very close to me who knows what happened at that time and knows the horror of war hundreds of times more than we do. I thought that this event was a way to pray for peace. I painted because I really want world peace."

"I wrote the thoughts of those who died in the war on the lantern."

"The picture of hands holding a heart means that everyone is making peace, and the bluebird is a symbol of peace, so I drew it."

"I drew a picture of the sky, hoping to see beautiful skies and blue skies all over the world."

(2) What do you want to convey to the people of Mid-somerset through the lantern?

"I really want peace, so let's all do our best to end war as soon as possible!"

"Touro is part of Japanese culture, but I share the same desire for peace as you do. I would like to see lanterns spread to other regions."

"People are never alone. Although they may be from different countries, there are people who carry out the Toro Float."

"As a Hiroshima resident, I'm happy that people overseas are also thinking about the atomic bomb. I also want more people to know about it."

"I would like people to think about the people who suffered from the atomic bomb through the lanterns."

"Hiroshima is a city that suffered from atomic bombing, but we are spreading the word about peace both domestically and internationally. I was very happy because I didn't know that other countries also held lantern floats. I would like people of Mid-somerset to continue to carry out lantern floats on August 6th."

(3) What did you think when you saw the photo of Mid-somerset's Touro Float?

"We are from a different country in terms of culture and language, but when I saw the photos, I felt that my thoughts were being conveyed to the people of Mid-somerset, and it was good to see that the people there also pray for peace."

"It was very beautiful. I thought the people who died from the atomic bombing would also be very happy."
