Civil society Involvement in Peacebuilding in Colombia

We are delighted and privileged that Dr Andrei Gomez-Suarez & Dr Gwen Burnyeat, both "practical academics" living in Ox-

ford, happily agreed to give a talk about their first-hand experiences of peacebuilding in Colombia. Both are part of peacebuilding organisation Rodeemos el Dialogo ("Embrace the Dialogue") a transnational network of Colombians and friends of Colombia co-founded by Andrei.





They will tell us about:

- •the peace process with the FARC,
- •the peace community of San José de Apartadó
- •Rodeemos el Diálogo
- •the struggle to combat disinformation in the peace referendum,

•and a bit about how things are today under President Petro

Gwen was a Junior Research Fellow in Political Anthropology at Merton College, Oxford, and Andrei is Senior Research Fellow in Reconciliation and Peacebuilding in the Centre of Religion, Reconciliation and Peace, University of Winchester.

15 people on 13 screens, including friends from Oxford and Salisbury, met to share information about groups who are trying to reach out across the divide between Israel and Palestine. There are many! Those mentioned included:

Seeds of Peace which organises camps every year to bring together Israelis and Palestinians. Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam, an intentional community/village of Jews and Arabs living side by side.

Refuser Solidarity – supporting young Israelis who refuse to bear arms to suppress Palestinians. Women in Black – groups all over the world who vigil in support of oppressed minorities. Women Waging Peace – recently founded to accompany Palestinians needing treatment in Israeli hospitals. Sadly one of the founders was killed by Hamas on October 7th.

5 Broken Cameras – an award-winning documentary shot by a Palestinian journalist.

Breaking the Silence – an organisation of Israelis who have done National Service and are trying to open the eyes of young Israelis to the reality of life in West Bank.

Hand in Hand – a charity which runs many integrated schools.

Also: Jewish Voice for Peace; Rabbis for Human Rights; Divan Orchestra.

Globally: 62 people per sq Km

Oxfordshire: 37 people per sq Km

Israel: 400 people per sq Km

Gaza: 5,555 people per sq Km

Singapore, Hong Kong, Macao and one or two others are more densely populated than

Gaza.

And land areas?

London covers 1572 sq km

Oxfordshire 2605 sq km

Gaza 365 sq km

My father told me I had ruined my husband's career by being in CND, but when he got his PhD, Aldermaston promptly sent an invite to join them in making the bombs. Bad communication somewhere? Or keeping friends close and enemies closer?

In Soho the Partisan coffee shop opened up, all trendy with chess boards for customers to use. Upstairs the CND had an office. One night our Secret Service raided this and removed the CND membership files. It was frightening; what would they do to us? In the end, nothing.

My husband got a job in Berkeley, but that was cancelled when they discovered the CND connection so we ended up in more tolerant and more neutral Canada, in lovely Vancouver on the Pacific coast. In Canada CND was very small because Canadians knew they would not be affected by such a war.

Four years later, back in England, my husband doing useful peaceful work trying to control plasma at Culham, I joined local CND, attended the meetings, and remember a lovely summer party at one top scientist's garden in Albert Park. Then children, divorce and I lost touch with that world, being a social scientist, not physicist.

Abingdon Peace Group joins 21 other organisations calling on Russia and Ukraine to stop persecuting conscientious objectors.

As part of an international week of action in early December we co-signed a letter calling on the Russian and Ukrainian governments to respect the rights of conscientious objectors, who currently risk jail in both countries for refusing to participate in the war. Identically-worded letters were delivered in person to the Russian & Ukrainian embassies. The letters started, "We are writing to you as a group of peace, faith-based and human rights organisations based in the UK. We wish to express our grave concern regarding the situation of conscientious objectors from Russia and Ukraine and human rights defenders working on their behalf".

Parents Circle statement: from Peace News November 2023.

At the Remembrance ceremony in Tavistock Square on Armistice Day, 11th November, a touching statement was read out by Isabel Kelly on behalf of Parents Circle – Families Forum, a joint Israeli-Palestinian organisation of over 600 families, all of whom have lost an immediate family member to the ongoing conflict:

'We, the members of the Parents Circle – Families Forum, grieving Israeli and Palestinian families, express deep sorrow for the thousands of dead and condemn the shocking acts of violence....

'Thousands of victims aren't just numbers; they represent shattered dreams, unfulfilled futures and broken loves....

'The past weeks have brought upon us seemingly never-ending shock and storms of emotion. We fear the future and pray that the cursed war ends as soon as possible, that violent incidents will not break out in other places, and that the killing from both sides will stop.

'We are still determined to believe that only an agreement and a political solution will put an end to wars, occupation, suffering, victims and prisoners....

'Violence breeds more violence and the the only way to end it is a solution that meets the needs of both nations for security, freedom, respect and welfare.'

The Path of MADness 2024 will be held at the former cold war air base at Upper Heyford at 11am on Sunday 28th January, starting at the Heritage Centre, 103 Castle Street, Bicester, OX25 5BX. The centre are asking for a £5 contribution to their nominated charity www.giraffesontour.co.uk/ and for car registrations (unfortunately the site can only be accessed by car but hopefully we can car share). There is no limit on numbers.

The event includes a service in a Hardened Aircraft Shelter and then the opportunity to walk the NATO Runway i.e. the Path of MADness. [MAD = Mutually Assured Destruction ..Ed]

Contributions can be made to the service, reflecting on nuclear holocaust, genocides and crimes against humanity. Climate collapse and the 6th great extinction could also be included.
