MP's claim

MR Glen's View from the Commons piece (We must stand shoulder to shoulder with all our allies, March 5) needs answering. He claims to have heard from a 'small handful of constituents' wishing to disown the actions of the US and Israel in the current

war in Iran and the wider region. Polls show the majority are of this view.

He then goes on to imply that this 'small handful' are supporters of the despotic Iranian regime. Because people think that yet more bombing, killing and destruction is not acceptable does not make them supporters of Iran. They also point out the war has no legal justification nor any clear objectives. It is a repeat of Iraq.

Only small numbers write to Mr Glen on this topic because they know it is a waste of time. As a member of the Conservative Friends of Israel group - the largest and best funded of the parliamentary lobby groups - any criticism of Israel's activities he seems simply to ignore. It's curious he does not declare his membership in the column.

It is also interesting that in the list he provides of all our allies needing support, Israel

is not mentioned. Could this be because he is aware of how many of his constituents are sceptical of Israel's actions in the region, their initiation of this latest round of violence, and their continuing destruction of Gaza with its death toll now over 75,000?

The question therefore arises: who is Mr Glen representing? His constituents many of whom are concerned about yet more death and destruction in the area, or a foreign power which has invested large sums and employed considerable lobbying to persuade MPs to their view?
